South West Area

A brief introduction to myself, for those that don't know me. My name's Liz Wozniak and I've been a dancer with Beltane Border Morris for 10 years. Before then I danced with my own side, AngleTwitch and before that Exmoor Border and Bourne Borderers – you can see the theme here – I'm not a Cotswold dancer, although I've picked up a few dances in that style and a few Molly dances on the way, too.

As there was a vacancy for the SW Rep last year I put myself forward and here I am. I can report that it's been a quiet year! I started the year thinking I might get round to seeing some of the OM sides in the SW performing but our own morris schedule kept me pretty busy. So I struck upon the last minute idea to contact all the sides and ask if they could give me some positive feedback about their year – and, happily, I've had a good smattering of responses.

I can, therefore report that:

Old Town Twelves (Plymouth) love the fact that their dances are rooted in place and time: they enjoy linking their dances to stories of their past, to give context in public performance and to engage passers-by who probably know very little about morris. "Our thing is to dance locally and one group we have supported is the Tulgey Woods Sanctuary, which is a local community group where green space, nature, culture and local community cohesion is the essence of what they do. We love to support them and dancing for a first wassail, in the city of Plymouth makes us proud of what we do", writes Alison Chapman.

"The other element of our side is friendship: we are an eclectic bunch from all ages and walks of life (from our 60s to 20s) and we are home to local people and we represent many equality strands. We go out for days out, we regularly meet at folk sessions and like to see new music and theatre together. We especially love trains and buses!!"

Plymouth Clog write that they collect for charity - currently SW Blood Bikes. They've experienced injury and illness this year but have managed to recruit 3 new members (although more would be welcome) and are moving to being a mixed side, having redesigned their kit in 2023.

Beltane (Chudleigh/Dartmoor) can report that this coming year is their 25th anniversary and celebratory ideas are being discussed. They are looking for a festival abroad (maybe someone has some suggestions?) that our huge gang can attend. Fortunately they haven't had any recruitment issues and have an active dance membership of around 30 to 35 members. The side have participated in some filming for the BBC this year but until the programme is aired in the spring, are absolutely bound to not breathe a word about it. All will be revealed in due course. Interestingly, our very own Hetty Bevington, OM Secretary, was helping to keep us in order in her work capacity on set.

Hetty also dances with Tatters Morris in Redruth, Cornwall and they enjoy having children dance alongside the adults.

West Somerset Morris celebrated 60 years of dancing this year. They had a 2 day tour throughout West Somerset with their guests Taunton Deane MM, Sweet Coppin (Clog) and Chalice MM. They report that they've recruited new, younger members both dancers and musicians that have kept them on their toes. And, like others above, have collected for Charity.

Bill Davies of Cynewulf Morris (Lyme Regis area) writes that they have had success in joining their local Co-op Community Sponsorship scheme. They've been given £1200 this year and, in past years, have had grant funding from Waitrose Community Scheme. This is a great tip and all sides could try this avenue of funding in their local area.

Of the 15 sides based in the area, I've had 6 replies although I was not able to contact two of the sides.

Thank you very much to the sides that did respond. I think it's great to hear morris news and lament the fact we don't currently have a magazine editor in place.

Wales and Northwest Area

2025 has been a mixed year for sides in Wales and the Northwest.

A few sides in the NW are really struggling for numbers or practice venue and are holding on in the hope of better times, but not meeting or performing.

Other NW sides have had a little success with recruiting, or at least holding on to members, with regular pub dance outs during the summer, sometimes with each other. Mucky Mountains probably win the prize for best recruitment, with 4 new members last year and another 4 this year!

Our newest side in the area, Hoylake, started up last December, have already danced out on several occasions, including fielding 20 members at the JMO Day of Dance, and have a settled core of 12 regulars now. Some of us can only wish for such a turnout! In Wales, Cadi Ha joined in the All Wales Weekend, which was resurrected after a long hiatus. We were the only OM side there, but can recommend it to the other Welsh member sides.

Cadi Ha have also enjoyed a recruitment bonanza over the past 12 months after many years of staggering along, often without music or sufficient dancers to perform even our

trademark 4 person dances. We have picked up a musician who is new to morris, but is brilliant. We also have 6 (yes 6!!) new dancers - 5 under 30 and one an ex Squire of Eryri Morris, returning after a 30 year hiatus. All picking it up well and mostly dancing out already.

Don't lose hope - there are closet morris dancers out there, even among the youngsters!
